

Free Black History Walking Tour of Plymouth

Pilgrim Hall Museum will co-host an African-American history tour of downtown Plymouth on Saturday, February 22nd from 1-2 pm as part of Black History month. The free-to-the-public program is a co-presentation of the Plymouth No Place for Hate Committee and Pilgrim Hall Museum, in partnership with Bethel AME Church of Plymouth.

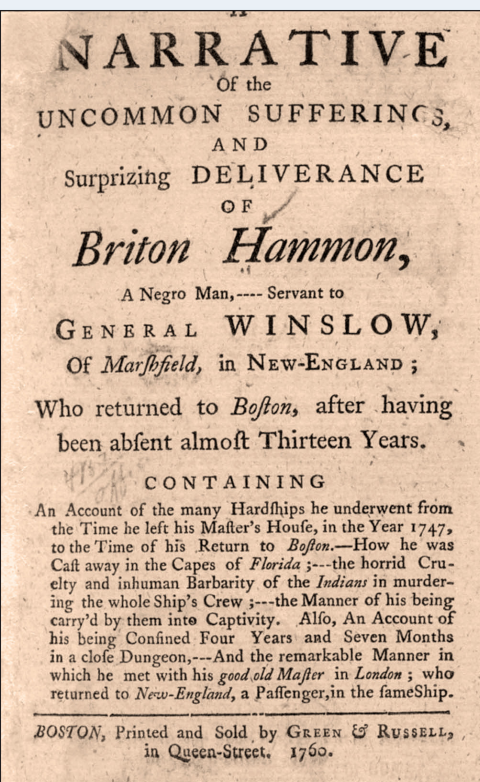
Highlighting stories of Plymouth's African-American residents in the 18th to the 20th century, the free walking tour will be guided by Dr. Donna Curtin, Executive Director of Pilgrim Hall Museum. Tucked along the narrow streets and byways of downtown Plymouth are often overlooked sites of Black history, including places connected to Plymouth's population of enslaved residents in the colonial era, antebellum activists and Civil War soldiers, and modern Plymouthans in the 20th century.

The tour kicks off in Shirley Square in front of the historic Winslow-Warren House, where America's very first published African-American author is believed to have lived before 1740, and concludes at the historic Bethel AME Church and Parsonage at 6 Sever Street, where light refreshments will be offered following the tour.

No reservations required. To attend, meet at 1 pm at Shirley Square in downtown Plymouth at the head of North Street. The tour involves vigorous walking on changing terrain with inclines and stairs.
